



Continuing Education Scholarships

The **T.E.A.C.H.** (<u>Teacher Education and Compensation Helps</u>) Early Childhood® Alabama Scholarship program is an effective strategy in helping address the need for a well-qualified, fairly compensated and stable early childhood workforce in Alabama.

The goals of the T.E.A.C.H. Early Childhood® Scholarship Program are to increase education, increase compensation and reduce turnover of the child care workforce while making educational opportunities more accessible and affordable. The program provides the opportunity for individuals currently working in the early childhood field to take coursework to increase their knowledge and skills by giving them access to early childhood credentials and a college degree.

Scholarships are offered to child care and pre-school teachers, directors and family child care home providers working in a Department of Human Resources (DHR) licensed child care or First Class Pre-K program willing to sponsor the recipient. Applicants must be working a minimum number of hours in the classroom with children, and meet wage requirements for each scholarship model.

Scholarships are currently for the CDA (Child Development Associate Assessment Fee, Associates Degrees in Child Development and Early Care and Education and Bachelor Degrees in Child Development and Early Education.

Alabama's community colleges seek to provide students with quality education in order to provide the skills and knowledge needed to teach and work with young children. If you work in a licensed or exempt from licensure child care facility in the state, then you may qualify for the <u>Leadership in</u>

<u>Child Care Scholarship</u> to help fund your education at an Alabama community college or Athens State University.

This scholarship, which is made available from funding by the Alabama Department of Human Resources, provides students with the opportunity to pursue several different credentials and degrees in Child Development/Early Care and Education/Early Childhood Education studies at a community college or at Athens State.

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"Naptime Nuggets: Professional Learning in Bite-Size Sessions"

In the fast—paced world of early childhood education, finding time for professional development can be a challenge. That's why we've designed Naptime Nuggets —a series of one-hour, high-impact trainings tailored explicitly for early childhood professionals to engage in learning during the quiet moments of the day. Each session focuses on practical, research-informed strategies that can be immediately applied in the classroom, supporting both personal growth and improved outcomes for young children.

These sessions are:

- Timely— Delivered in one-hour formats to fit within rest periods.
- Targeted—Centered on key early learning topics like emotional support, literacy, behavior guidance, inclusion, and classroom culture.
- · Transformational—Built to inspire, refresh, and equip educators with tools they can use right away.

Whether it's a deep dive into building emotional resilience, fostering early literacy through storytelling, or strengthening teacher-child relationships, these trainings aim to nurture the nurturers, without adding stress to the day.

Topics Include:

The Power of Presence: Building Connection Through Everyday Moments

This session explores how consistent, warm interactions with children create emotional safety and trust. Participants will learn simple strategies to be more present and responsive, even during busy moments, and how those interactions impact brain development and classroom behavior.

Storytime Strategies: Enhancing Literacy in Little Learners

Discover ways to make story time more interactive, inclusive, and impactful. Educators will explore book selection tips, questioning techniques, and literacy extensions that support language development and love of reading in early learners.

· Gentle Discipline: Supporting Behavior with Compassion and Consistency

This session focuses on guiding behavior through connections rather than control. Participants will learn positive discipline tools rooted in empathy, structure, and child development, which will help reduce power struggles and promote cooperation.

- · Creating Calm: Mindfulness Tools for Teachers and Toddlers Learn simple mindfulness techniques to use with both children and yourself. From breathing games to calming corners, this session offers practical tools for creating a more peaceful, focused classroom
- · Culturally Responsive Care in Early Learning Settings Explore how to honor children's identities through inclusive teaching practices, materials, and interactions. This session supports educators in building classrooms where every child feels seen, valued, and respected.

Infant-Toddler Training

Mirror, Mirror: Positive Body Image in Infants and Toddlers

Body image is how we feel about our bodies. People's body image can be influenced by their own feelings and by the reactions of those around them. During this training, participants will be able to identify ways to promote a positive body image in infants and toddlers.

Have You Crossed the Line?

Are you looking for ways to give your infants and toddlers a hand-up on development? Why not cross the line, the midline that is! By setting up activities to get them moving across their bodies, you will be helping your children develop fine motor, tracking and reading skills as they grow and develop.

Supporting Language Development and Connecting Through Baby Dolls

Playing with baby dolls during circle time is a way to support early language development through meaningful, responsive interactions. As children talk, sing, and roll play with their baby dolls, they are building vocabulary, practicing conversational turn-talking, and strengthening expressive language skills. In this training, participants will learn strategies to use with their infants and toddlers to strengthen their language development.

Creating A Playful Learning Environment for Infants and Toddlers

Play is an important part of childhood that helps children learn and grow. Through play, children learn about the world while practicing the skills that allow them to explore it. When we facilitate children's play, we provide ideal learning environments that are rich with context and meaning. These joyful experiences motivate learning because play is fun, and fun is fuel for learning!

Power of Language for Infants and Toddlers

Are you currently using responsive interactions with the children in your class? In this training, you will learn the five elements of responsive interactions (tuning in, facial expressions, touch, gestures, and child directed speech) along with strategies to help you plan for each day in a way that increases opportunities for responsive interactions and building language in your infant toddler classrooms.

APT: From Overwhelmed to Optimistic

Challenging behavior in the toddler years can be overwhelming at times. Let us learn more about social emotional milestones, skills for self-regulation, and ways to promote positive behavior in the toddler classroom and explore free PBS resources to use in the classroom and to share with families.

Preschool Training

Playing It Safe: How to Create Safe Spaces

We are living in a day and time where creating safe spaces for children is a vital part of the learning environment. Come along with us as we discuss the elements of a safe space and ways to effectively create those spaces for young children.

Why Science? We Unknowingly Use Science Everyday

Did you know that you use science daily in your classroom unknowingly? Science is everywhere. It is the process of exploring, asking questions, and discovering how things work in the world around us. Children are natural scientists. They love to ask questions, touch, and figure out how things work. During this training, we will discuss ways to incorporate science in your classroom daily.

Preschool Training

APT: Raising Readers

"The more that you read, the more things you will know. The more you learn, the more places you'll go. "Dr. Suess. With PBSKids resources, we will discover ways to introduce, facilitate and support literacy and reading with young children.

The Role of D.A.P in a Preschool Age World

Each child has different ways of learning, but each child needs the same thing which is to be met right where they are in their development. Teaching children according to their development and specific needs is the basis of Developmentally Appropriate Practices. We meet the child where they're at and then help the child grow. As the Teacher, we provide the environment, connection, and tools to help foster and advance their development.

CCDF Training

To meet the Health and Safety requirements for your facilities participating, we offer CCDF Areas together in 2 hour training sessions. Some sessions may be available only every other quarter. These sessions are also available for on-site training.

CCDF Areas 1 & 3: Prevention & Control of Infectious Diseases/Administration of Medication

Daycares and preschools sometimes have a reputation for being "germ factories." That is to say little people are often sick. As providers, we would love to avoid the sniffles, the fevers and other discomforts associated with childhood illness. We will look at how to keep our children as healthy as possible.

CCDF Areas 2 & 6: SIDS & Safe Sleep Practices/Shaken Baby Syndrome & Abusive Head Trauma

This training will provide an overview of reducing the risk of sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS), using safe sleep practices for childcare settings, and identifying and preventing shaken baby syndrome.

CCDF Areas 4 & 7: Emergencies Due to Food & Allergic Reactions/Emergency Preparedness

We will look at the standards that pertain to programs developing contingency plans for emergencies or disaster situations when it may not be possible or feasible to follow standard or previously agreed upon emergency procedures. We will also look at how to prepare and care for children with food allergies.

CCDF 5 & 8 Building and Physical Premises Safety and Handling & Storage of Hazardous Materials

"Children need to be safe in order to learn and develop their full potential... because young children like to explore, consistent safety practices...prevent children from getting into dangerous situations." - National Center on Early Childhood Quality Assurance. This training will review and observe potential health and safety hazards. We will also identify strategies to prevent injuries in any environment.

CCDF Areas 10 & 11: Child Abuse & Neglect/First Aid

In this training, participants will learn how federal legislation lays the groundwork for state laws on child maltreatment by identifying a minimum set of actions or behaviors that define child abuse and neglect, and how to identify and develop skills they need to understand in meeting a child's emotional, physical, and developmental needs. This training will also equip participants with a basic knowledge of first aid and skills to help with sick or injured children in their care that is man-dated by state law. This training does not cover CPR.

Family/All Training

PALS: The Connection Between Active Play and Social Emotional Learning in Early Childhood

Young children start learning social emotional skills from birth. Like skills across developmental domains, social-emotional skills are learned best in safe environments with nurturing adults. Active play allows children to practice developmental skills as they follow their interests. During this training, we will explore four social emotional skills and identify how active play can encourage skill development.

Explore the Space: Inside and Out!

The physical space of a childcare center plays a significant role in a child's overall experience. The layout of each classroom and outdoor area matter to those in or visiting your center. The materials and maintenance of these areas play a part in ensuring a fun and safe environment for both children and teachers. We will explore the spaces in our centers and make sure we are providing the best possible environment for our children and staff.

Developmentally Appropriate Play Practices for Play

DAP for Play ensures that young children learn and grow through meaningful, hands-on experiences tailored to their age, individual needs, and cultural backgrounds. By supporting child-led exploration with thoughtful guidance, educators foster creativity, problem-solving, and social-emotional development—making play a powerful foundation for lifelong learning.



Director Training

Building Authentic Relationships with Parents

Fostering strong, authentic relationships with parents is key to supporting student success and creating a positive school community. During this training, participants will discuss practical strategies to build trust, improve communication, and engage families as valued partners in the learning process.

Make Literacy Work in Your Center

Take a look at your center or program. Are your teachers using developmentally appropriate practices in their classrooms? This class will give directors a better understanding of "developmentally appropriate practices." Directors will learn what D.A.P is and how to recognize if a classroom is developmentally appropriate.

APT: Different Leadership Styles: What Is My Style?

What type of leader are you? How can you strengthen your leadership practices? Why doesn't this one leadership style work for you? In this training, we will explore these questions, and many others, through discussions and demonstrations.

Physical Activity Learning Sessions (PALS)

The PALS content addresses physical activity for children birth through age five. The goal of PALS is to support practice and policy changes in ECE programs. PALS combine content learning with facility-level self-assessments, policy development opportunities, resources, and materials to support practice changes in ECE programs leading to more healthier, more active children.

Session 1-Physical Activity is Important in Early Childhood (1hr)

Session 2-Best Practices for Physical Activity in ECE Settings: Time and Space (1hr)

Session 3-Best Practices for Physical Activity in ECE Settings: Type, Daily Activities and Provider's Role (1hr)

Session 4-Best Practices for Physical Activity in ECE Settings: Families, Training and Resources, Policies (1hr)

Session 5-Best Practices for Physical Activity in ECE Settings: Goal Setting and Action Planning (1hr)

These sessions must be completed in one day. Suggested time is 8am-2pm (1 hr. lunch included) *There will be physical activity resources given at the end of the training.

Farm to Early Care and Education

Farm to early care and education (farm to ECE) offers increased access to the same three core elements of local food sourcing, school gardens and food and agriculture education to enhance the quality of the educational experience in all types of ECE settings (e.g., preschools, child care centers, family child care homes, Head Start/Early Head Start, programs in K - 12 school districts). Farm to ECE offers benefits that parallel the goals and priorities of the early care and education community including emphasis on experiential learning opportunities, parent and community engagement and life-long health and wellness for children, families and caregivers.

Child Care Enhancement with a Purpose

UPDATE as of March 1st at 8:00am.

Alabama's special needs childcare subsidy is now accepting new referrals. Limited spaces are available.

Parents must call Melissa at 256-859-4900 to complete a referral by phone. Referrals are not considered complete until **ALL** required documents have been received. Be prepared to leave one voicemail. All calls will be returned in the order received.

Documents required include a pdf scan or fax (2568594332) of current therapy plan, IFSP and/or access to these documents before calling to complete the referral.

If you have received any type of childcare subsidy within the past year, you will not be eligible to apply unless dismissal from a childcare center has been documented with your CMA.

Alabama's Special Needs Childcare Subsidy

Updated Eligibility Requirements:

Effective February 1, 2024

If you answer yes to any of these questions, your child <u>MAY</u> be eligible to receive Alabama's Special Needs Childcare Subsidy:

Is your child in Early Intervention? If so, you will automatically be eligible for Alabama's Special Needs Childcare Subsidy.

Does your child receive speech, occupational, or physical therapy? Current copy of IFSP, IEP, or therapy plan required

Does your child have a diagnosis or a significant medical or psychological impairment? Some qualifying diagnoses include Autism Spectrum Disorder, Down syndrome, Cerebral Palsy, etc. Proof of diagnosis required

Is your child medically fragile? A physician's letter or documentation outlining accommodations needed by your child is required

Does your child have an IEP and receive two or more services two times per week at a DHR licensed childcare program?

Does your child receive two or more outpatient services two times per week at their place of childcare?
