AELG: Alabama Early Learning Guidelines

The Alabama Early Learning Guidelines were developed by DHR to promote continuity of high quality care and learning for children ages 0-5. The AELG course is worth 18 hours of credit, and will consist of readings, activities, and discussions that will be a guide for understanding child development and learning and for implementing best practice in order to prepare children for success in school and in life. This course will be given at the main office in Talladega.

If you have previously taken the online OR face-to-face AELG course, you will not receive credit again.

The course will run January 8—March 18, 2024 from 6:00-8:00PM.

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The **T.E.A.C.H.** (<u>Teacher Education and Compensation Helps</u>) Early Childhood® Alabama Scholarship program is an effective strategy in helping address the need for a well-qualified, fairly compensated and stable early childhood workforce in Alabama

AProject of Alabama Partnership for Children

The goals of the T.E.A.C.H. Early Childhood® Scholarship Program are to increase education, increase compensation and reduce turnover of the child care workforce while making educational opportunities more accessible and affordable. The program provides the opportunity for individuals currently working in the early childhood field to take coursework to increase their knowledge and skills by giving them access to early childhood credentials and a college degree.

Scholarships are offered to child care and pre-school teachers, directors and family child care home providers working in a Department of Human Resources (DHR) licensed child care or First Class Pre-K program willing to sponsor the recipient. Applicants must be working a minimum number of hours in the classroom with children, and meet wage requirements for each scholarship model.

Scholarships are currently for the CDA (Child Development Associate Assessment Fee, Associates Degrees in Child Development and Early Care and Education and Bachelor Degrees in Child Development and Early Education.

Building Up for Quality

The purpose of this initiative is to reach out to early childhood education directors with the following questions:

- 1. What do you think your teachers might need?
- 2. How can we build up your teachers, and not tear them down?

We will work side-by-side with center directors and classroom teachers. The director will give CCC staff a professional development plan for their staff. We will then prepare for aiding the classroom teachers and building them up for higher quality services.

CCC staff will visit and observe classrooms, as requested by directors. The teacher will be given a 2 question evaluation. After observing the classroom, CCC staff will demonstrate/model appropriate classroom behavior/management techniques. The teacher will then be given the opportunity to demonstrate what hey have learned. CCC staff will continue to work with the teacher as they, along with the director and teacher, feel necessary. An evaluation will be given at the end of the session.

The session will count as a 1-hour training for the classroom teacher, and they will receive a professional development certificate that meets DHR Performance Standards.

Infant-Toddler Training

APT: The Power of Play

Fred Rogers said, "Play is really the work of childhood." Through this 2-hour training, we will discuss ways to effectively implement play throughout the day using songs, movements, free play, as well as structured play. Come play with us!

APT: Stuck Like Glue: Healthy Attachment for Infants and Toddlers

Providing and fostering healthy attachment is important to the development of infants and toddlers. In this training, we will discuss ways to implement and build healthy attachment styles by utilizing a variety of hands-on activities, PBS KIDS resources and children's books.

Developing Empathy in Young Children

Empathy is the ability to imagine how someone else is feeling in a particular situation and respond with care. This is a very complex skill to develop. Understanding and showing empathy is the result of many social-emotional skills that are developing in the first years of life. Many times, teachers think that young children are not ready to learn this skill. The answer is Yes! You can help a child be more empathetic! In this training, teachers will learn practical tips to help infants and toddlers develop empathy and understand that others have different thoughts and feelings than they do.

Talk to Me! Supporting Language and Literacy Skills in Infants and Toddlers

Babies are not born talking, they learn language, starting immediately from birth. How does this process take place? When do children master the skills needed for using language successfully? What stages do they go through as they learn to understand and talk? Do the languages they learn affect the way they think? In this training, we will discuss how children learn a first language, the stages of development they go through, and how they use language as they learn.

APT: Best Practices for Language Acquisition

A growing body of research reveals just how important it is for infants and toddlers to be exposed to many forms of language including reading, writing, talking, singing, and playing starting at birth. The five practices of literacy covered in this training are fundamental to children's growth as future readers. In this 2-hour training, caregivers will learn the ways in which they can best help children acquire language and literacy skills through everyday interactions and activities.

Rhythm & Rhyme - A Lot More Than Just Fun Time!

In this training, teachers will be introduced to a universal language of words, rhythm, and movement that sparks the imagination of infants and toddlers in your class and allows them to express their thoughts and emotions. Teachers will learn to use songs, rhymes, and fingerplays to have responsive interactions that build strong relationships and children's knowledge about the world, as well as help develop the skills that form the foundation for literacy.

Power of Language for Infants and Toddlers

Are you currently using responsive interactions with the children in your class? In this training, you will learn the five elements of responsive interactions (tuning in, facial expressions, touch, gestures, and child directed speech) along with strategies to help you plan for each day in a way that increases opportunities for responsive interactions and building language in your infant toddler classrooms.

STEMing at an Early Age

STEM is the future! Some teachers wonder if you can teach STEM to children at an early age; are you one of them? If so, this training is for you. During this training we will discuss each component of STEM and explore STEM activities for our younger leaners.

Preschool Training

Oh! The Kitchen is a Mess! Super Fun Kitchen Science Experiments

How does a straw work? What happens when you mix baking soda and vinegar? How much sugar can you stir into a full glass of water? The answers to these questions and more are as near as your own kitchen or cafeteria. With a few simple materials, you can test the chemical composition of a potato, remove the shell from a raw egg without touching it, and turn milk into plastic. Are you ready for some fun? Then join us for this training as we go to the kitchen and get started.

Let's Tinker! Incorporating Makerspaces in the Early Childhood Classroom


What can you add to your early childhood classroom that will immerse children in rich learning, reduce challenging behaviors, and develop confidence as well as critical thinking and problem-solving skills? A makerspace! It's just not for big kids! Children are natural makers, and early childhood teachers and caregivers have been providing opportunities to create, engineer, and fabricate since before it was officially labeled as a "makerspace." Join us as we learn how to create a makerspace in your early childhood classroom.


AL After School Program: Amplify Family Engagement and Student Success through Communication and Collaboration

Parents and families are a crucial component of children's lives. Effective guidance from childcare and after-school professionals enhances the academic and social-emotional support they provide their children. Research shows that children do better in school, improve their attitudes and behaviors, and are less likely to drop out of school when parents are involved in their education. Childcare and afterschool professionals can build parents' knowledge and confidence and serve as an important liaison between families and regular school day staff. Join us as we discuss strategies for encouraging open, two-way conversation between parents and educators and providing essential resources by connecting families to community services and support. Celebrate what is good about your current family engagement framework and discover how you can amplify it to a new level!

Family Engagement: A Strengths-Based Approach

Family engagement is the process we use to build positive goal-oriented relationships with families. It is mutually respectful, responsive to families' cultures and languages, and includes genuine efforts to understand each family's beliefs, values, and priorities. Effective family engagement involves parents and professionals working together toward the goals that families choose for themselves and their children. During this training, you will be able to explore strengths-based strategies for early childhood educators and programs to engage families in meaningful ways.





Family/All Training

Building Positive Relationships

Humans have a basic need for belonging and connection. We're naturally motivated to develop and maintain personal bonds with others. During this training, you will have an understanding why having positive relationships within the classroom and workplace is important.

Nursery Rhyme Crime Escape Room


You will be in the land of Nursery Rhymes. This Escape Room will transport you to a land where the characters of Nursery Rhymes are walking and talking, real-living beings. However, something is happening to them. One by one, they are all disappearing and only you can stop it. Can you save the missing characters? During this training, you will explore the lost art of nursery rhymes.

Celebrating Multiculturalism in the Classroom

Join us for this training to discuss what a multi-cultural, diversity-rich classroom should look like and why it is important.

What Will We Play Today?

Are you running out of ways to get children excited about learning? Through play, young children learn about their bodies and their movement capabilities. Too often, the arts in early childhood are seen as too difficult to incorporate because teachers do not feel they can inspire children. The arts add elements of drama, music, movement, language play on words, gestures, and rhyming. In this training, we will discover the idea of arts games, combining the arts and games, to inspire children's inventiveness and imagination.



Director Training

Do I Have Time?

Time management is the strategy of planning out your available time and controlling the amount of time you spend on specific tasks in order to work more efficiently. Effective time management comes easier to some people than to others. During this training, you will understand the importance of effective time management and how it can make your day more manageable.

Swinging Pendulums: Thoughtful Topics that Affect Your Daily Work with Children and Families

Navigate through the extreme swings of opinion in educational philosophy, regulations, and practices, and focus on the middle ground. Covering a variety of topics encourages you as a director to reflect on your policies and teaching methods, helps you consider the reasons why some ideas might or might not work in your program.

Trauma is Real: Helping Teachers Create a Trauma-Sensitive Environment

Trauma is Real. As professionals and caregivers, it is our responsibility to provide a safe, predictable setting for children to be, learn, and thrive. In this training, we will discuss the big four ideas and strategies to help teachers create a trauma-sensitive environment.

CCDF Training

To meet the Health and Safety requirements for your facilities participating, we offer CCDF Areas together in 2 hour training sessions. Some sessions may be available only every other quarter. These sessions are also available for on-site training.

CCDF Areas 1 & 3: Prevention & Control of Infectious Diseases/Administration of Medication Daycares and preschools sometimes have a reputation for being "germ factories." That is to say little people are often sick. As providers, we would love to avoid the sniffles, the fevers and other discomforts associated with childhood illness. We will look at how to keep our children as healthy as possible.

CCDF Areas 2 & 6: SIDS & Safe Sleep Practices/Shaken Baby Syndrome & Abusive Head Trauma
This training will provide an overview of reducing the risk of sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS), using safe sleep practices for childcare settings, and identifying and preventing shaken baby syndrome.

CCDF Areas 4 & 7: Emergencies Due to Food & Allergic Reactions/Emergency Preparedness

We will look at the standards that pertain to programs developing contingency plans for emergencies or disaster situations when it may not be possible or feasible to follow standard or previously agreed upon emergency procedures. We will also look at how to prepare and care for children with food allergies.

CCDF 5 & 8 Building and Physical Premises Safety and Handling & Storage of Hazardous Materials

"Children need to be safe in order to learn and develop their full potential... because young children like to explore, consistent safety practices...prevent children from getting into dangerous situations." - National Center on Early Childhood Quality Assurance. This training will review and observe potential health and safety hazards. We will also identify strategies to prevent injuries in any environment.

CCDF Areas 10 & 11: Child Abuse & Neglect/First Aid

In this training, participants will learn how federal legislation lays the groundwork for state laws on child maltreatment by identifying a minimum set of actions or behaviors that define child abuse and neglect, and how to identify and develop skills they need to understand in meeting a child's emotional, physical, and developmental needs. This training will also equip participants with a basic knowledge of first aid and skills to help with sick or injured children in their care that is man-dated by state law. This training does not cover CPR.

Alabama Early Learning Guidelines (AELG)

AELG Session I: Introduction

The purpose of this training is to involve learners in activities to become familiar with the Alabama Early Learning Guidelines Course and basic child development concepts. Through participation in these activities, learners will use the AELG to identify strategies to explain the origin and the purpose of the AELG, list the sessions included in the AELG Course, and to develop a basic understanding of concepts and terminology related to child development. Participants MUST complete the introduction in order to take the other sessions.

AELG Session II: Child Observation

The purpose of this session is to involve learners in activities to understand the critical importance of child observations. Through participation in these activities, learners will use AELG to, identify the purpose of intentional child observations, list 5 reasons to observe children, identify children's learning styles, demonstrate techniques of observing and reflecting on children, and demonstrate how to complete a Developmental Checklist.

AELG Session III: The Role of the Parent and Caregiver

The purpose of this session is to involve learners in activities to help facilitate positive relationships between parents and caregivers. Through participation in these activities, learners will, become familiar with ways to help start, build, and maintain positive relationships when children are in out-of-home care and set a positive tone for a partnership between parents and caregivers

AELG Session IV: Self-Concept and Emotional Development

The purpose of this session is to involve learners in activities to help children develop a positive picture of self and to understand and express their own emotions. Through participation in these activities, learners will identify strategies using AELG to become familiar with ways to help build self-esteem, help children identify and name their emotions, and guide children to regulate their behavior.

AELG Session V: Social Development

The purpose of this session is to involve learners in activities that will stimulate and enhance children's social interaction skills. Through participation in these activities, learners will demonstrate increased knowledge of children's social development and identify strategies using AELG that help children develop trusting relationships with nurturing adults, show interest in peers, demonstrate caring and cooperation, and try out roles and relationships through imitations.

AELG Session VI: Language and Literacy

The purpose of this session is to involve learners in activities to stimulate and enhance children's communication skills. Through participation in these activities, learners will use AELG to understand verbal and non-verbal communication, explore various methods of communication, identify with home languages, and become familiar with ages and stages of language and literacy development.

AELG Session VII: Physical Development

The purpose of this session is to involve learners in activities to stimulate and enhance children's physical skills necessary to move and engage in the world. Through participation in these activities, learners will use the AELG to identify strategies to strengthen gross and fine motor skills and be familiar with ways children acquire self-help skills.

AELG Session VIII: Cognitive Development

The purpose of this session is to involve learners in activities to help children build and expand concepts and develop problem solving abilities. Through participation in these activities, learners will use the AELG to identify strategies to help children gain an understanding of basic concepts and relationships and to apply knowledge to new situations solve problems.

AELG Session IX: Putting it All Together for Alabama's Children

The purpose of this session is to involve learners in activities that will encourage the use of available resources for caregivers, families, and children. Through participation in these activities, learners will identify strategies using the AELG to provide additional resources and materials to promote high quality care and education and to pull together information from the previous training sessions.

Physical Activity Learning Sessions (PALS)

The PALS content addresses physical activity for children birth through age five. The goal of PALS is to support practice and policy changes in ECE programs. PALS combine content learning with facility-level self-assessments, policy development opportunities, resources, and materials to support practice changes in ECE programs leading to more healthier, more active children.

Session 1-Physical Activity is Important in Early Childhood (1hr)

Session 2-Best Practices for Physical Activity in ECE Settings: Time and Space (1hr)

Session 3-Best Practices for Physical Activity in ECE Settings: Type, Daily Activities and Provider's Role (1hr)

Session 4-Best Practices for Physical Activity in ECE Settings: Families, Training and Resources, Policies (1hr)

Session 5-Best Practices for Physical Activity in ECE Settings: Goal Setting and Action Planning (1hr)

These sessions must be completed in one day. Suggested time is 8am-2pm (1 hr. lunch included) *There will be physical activity resources given at the end of the training.

Cooking Matters Series

Creating Positive Mealtime Attitudes (2hrs)

Positive early childhood experiences surrounding food and the social environment are critical for shaping healthy eating behaviors later in life. In this training, childcare providers will recognize their role in establishing healthy attitudes and behaviors towards food among the children in their care.

Safe Cooking with Confidence (2hrs)

Childcare providers learn to safely prepare more scratch-cooked meals for the children in their care. This training includes an overview of food skills and safety as well as hands-on-meal preparation using Child and Adult Food Care Program (CACFP) approved recipes.

Choosing Healthy Foods for Kids (2hrs)

Childcare providers play a crucial role in ensuring that children in their care get the nutrients they need to grow and be healthy. In this training, providers learn to make smart choices about the foods they serve to kids through hands-on nutrition-based activities.

Meal Appeal (1hr)

Early childhood is an ideal time to instill an appreciation for consuming a variety of healthy foods. In this training, providers will take part in hands-on activities that will show them various ways to encourage acceptance of healthy foods among children in their care

Menu Management on a Budget (1hr)

In this training, providers will discuss menu planning and shopping strategies they can use to make the most of their food dollars.

Partnering with Parents on Healthy Eating (1hr)

Children are more likely to learn healthy eating behaviors when they receive similar messages at home, in school or childcare, and in the community. This training provides tips and tools for communicating with parents and staff about best practices for feeding children and how to sustain those practices through setting healthy food policies.

*There will be nutrition related resources given at the end of each training.

Farm to Early Care and Education

Farm to early care and education (farm to ECE) offers increased access to the same three core elements of local food sourcing, school gardens and food and agriculture education to enhance the quality of the educational experience in all types of ECE settings (e.g., preschools, child care centers, family child care homes, Head Start/Early Head Start, programs in K - 12 school districts). Farm to ECE offers benefits that parallel the goals and priorities of the early care and education community including emphasis on experiential learning opportunities, parent and community engagement and life-long health and wellness for children, families and caregivers.

Facts for Service Providers to Share with Families

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

"DOES MY CHILD ALREADY HAVE TO BE IN DAYCARE?"

No, but please begin looking.

Eligibility does not guarantee childcare placement. The parent is responsible for identifying and enrolling their child in a DHR licensed childcare center or family/group home.

"IS THERE AN AGE LIMIT?"

No, as long as they are enrolled in before/after care or summer care at a licensed daycare center.

"ARE THERE ANY INCOME OR EMPLOYMENT REQUIREMENTS?"

No, the child's service plan (IEP or IFSP) is what qualifies them.

IS THERE AN APPLICATION ONLINE?

No, please HAVE PARENTS contact Melissa Anderson to apply!

Basics in Child Care

Being an early childhood educator requires you to be willing to wear many hats. As a new educator, remember that your job description may change on a daily basis. As an early childhood educator, you will be challenged to find new experiences to share with children. Basics in Child Care will guide educators through six fundamental areas of early childhood development to prepare them for caring for children, to be knowledgeable of child development, resourceful in planning activities, skilled in guiding behavior, and able to maintain healthy environments.

- -This training will provide new educators 6 hours of credit in a face to face training from 9am to 4pmin either Calhoun, Etowah and Talladega County.

Shaken Baby Syndrome & Abusive Head Trauma

A serious brain injury caused by shaking of an infant.

- Urgent medical attention is usually recommended by health care providers.
- May be dangerous or life threatening.
- Very rare (Fewer than 20,000 cases per year in US).
- Treatable by a medical professional.
- Requires lab test or imaging.
- Can last several years or be lifelong.
- Common for ages 5 and younger.

Training and Registration Policies

All trainings are related to one of the *Alabama Minimum Standards* training areas, Child Development Associate Content Areas, Alabama Pathways Core Knowledge Areas Child Care and Development Fund Areas.

Training Policies

- 1. Training begins on time. You are expected to arrive on time. For safety and to meet credit guidelines, the door to the session will be locked 5 minutes after the training begins. For 1 hour training sessions, no lateness is permitted, due to the timeframe of the session.
